Approximately 150 Law Enforcement officials from throughout the United States and more than 10 foreign countries gathered at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset, Kentucky, USA for the first International Roundtable on Police Challenges in the 21st Century from October 8-12, 2005.

The International Roundtable was sponsored by the Rural Law Enforcement Technology Center, a program of the National Institute of Justice (NIJ), U.S.

Department of Justice.

The Roundtable features sessions on Law Enforcement Science & Technology, Counterterrorism, Democratic/ Community Policing and future trends.

Federal dignitaries represented the U.S. Department of Justice, U.S. Department of Homeland Security, National Laboratories and academia.

The featured speaker at the



gala dinner was the Fifth District Congressman, Hal Rogers of Kentucky, who was instrumental in establishing the Rural Law Enforcement Technology Center in Hazard, Kentucky as well as finding funds for numerous Homeland Security initiatives.

Police officials, police academics and police technicians represented the security interests of the nations of Russia, Great Britain, Germany, Mongolia, Ukraine, Latvia, Turkey, Romania, Sri Lanka and Panama.

This Academy would be formed by a partnership between Eastern Kentucky University’s International Justice and Safety Institute (IJSI) and the National Antiterrorist Association of Mongolia (MNAA) and will be focused on Police Training and International Law. IJSI is a coalition of several leading U.S. Criminal Justice

Colleges. IJSI members are a mixture of experienced practitioners and academics that understand the stabilizing role of law enforcement in nation building and peacekeeping operations. Both IJSI and NAAM are non-government organizations (NGOs) and support democratization programs and the rule of law. The objectives of the Ronald Reagan International Peace Academy of South Asia co-located in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia and Richmond, Kentucky are to organize joint academic and scientific exchanges; exchange research and teaching personnel, students, and publications.

IJSI is planning to provide Law Enforcement Training to Senior Level Police Officials from Kazakhstan

IJSI, Eastern Kentucky University and Ministry of Interior of Kazakhstan have agreed to conduct senior police training of personnel of the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of Kazakhstan at the College of Justice and

Safety of Eastern Kentucky University and the Kentucky Police Academy in June of 2006. The cooperation between the Ministry of Interior of Kazakhstan and Eastern Kentucky University and the Kentucky Police

Academy has great potential and seems to be very promising because of quality of educational programs, technical facilities.
